#### INTRODUCTION

This document has been prepared for Ennistymon Tidy Towns group. It is important as Ennistymon awakens from its previous past as a vibrant market town that the reuse of all its previous small shops and vernacular buildings are afforded the care in order to preserve their historic fabric. This in turn will allow the town already impressive in its vernacular architecture to become a force among towns that have managed to preserve as many intact vernacular structures as possible. We would like the planning department, The Heritage officer and the newly appointed Conservation officer to seriously consider all the candidates outlined within this brief survey and include these within the list of Protected Structures in the new Clare County Development Plan for the greater good of Vernacular Heritage, Architectural Heritage and people and town of Ennistymon (Home of the traditional shopfronts and cascades).

Each structure is identified on the accompanying map marked EAS 000, Ennistymon Architectural Survey (EAS and identification number).

A three storied vernacular shop/pub dating to the late 18<sup>th</sup> early 19<sup>th</sup> century. Having an intact timber shop/pubfront inserted to ground floor retaining many original features. The timber shop/pubfront comprises a top cornice and long slender facia board supported by a total of four pilasters flanking a large fixed window and new recent timber panelled doors both have slender horizontal fan lights.

The roof is of natural slate with rendered chimneystack and rooflight. The walls are lined-and-ruled lime render. The four existing windows to the front façade have been alters and no original windows exist. The two pilasters either side of the large shop display window have each got a forged metal bracket for the insertion of a forged iron bar for the protection on the shop window glass, one of only two surviving vernacular shops on Parliament street to have such an eighteenth century feature surviving. Iron bar also survives within the building.

#### Appraishal.

A good surviving example of a vernacular structure and intact vernacular shopfront situated on the south side of Parliament Street within an existing Architectural Conservation Area (ACA). The structure is flanked either side by protected structures that have recently been conserved/restored in 2018 and 2012 (Connoles a Protected structure and Mc Mahons Pedoditory a Protected structure)

This building is an important component of the Parliament streetscape in Ennistymon. Its listing will give weight to its proper renovation and conservation of the intact vernacular shop/pub front and associated features.

A three storied vernacular dwelling dating to the late 18th early 19th century.

The roof is of natural slate with rendered chimneystack and rooflight. The walls are constructed of random limestone with a mid 20<sup>th</sup> century pebble dash finish. original windows exist throughout this structure. Interior stairwell of very good quality craftsmanship exists along with many features of original doors and architrave. The roof timber are a combination of hewn and milled large beams.

This building adds greatly to the overall character and uniqueness of Parliament Street Ennistymon.

#### Appraishal.

A good surviving example of a vernacular structure and intact vernacular dwelling once the home of a mister stradling who ran a dentist here in the early to mid 20<sup>th</sup> century. The current owners would like for this structure to be added to the list of protected structures contained within Clare County Development Plan.

It is to be removed as and when the new Ennistymon relief road bridge is built. When this happens this pump could be used in one of the other original site locations of fountains ie Lahinch road or bottom of church hill.
